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ARE STUDENTS PREPARED FOR ADULT LIFE? IMPORTANT UTAH POST-SCHOOL SURVEY

The purpose of school is to help students become successful adults. To find out how well this is happening for students with disabilities, a yearly survey seeks answers to how well young adults with disabilities are doing. Utah's 2012 telephone survey for students age 14 or over who left school in the 2010-2011 school year is going on right now through September. Students who have been out of school about a year may receive a call and can provide vital information that will help students who are coming through school now. If the student is not available, for example if the student is living out of state, parents may respond to the survey by providing as much information as they know about the student's present circumstances. If you receive a voice mail message about the survey, please call back. The survey can be completed in either English or Spanish. To learn more about Utah's post-school survey visit www.utahposthighsurvey.org. The website has information on what questions are included in the survey and how the information collected will be used. If your student is available, please encourage the student to answer the survey. It may help to stress that your student's answers are confidential and will help to improve special education for younger students. Here are some resources to help young adults understand the importance of completing the survey. To make sure that your student who is still in school or who left school last year can be contacted for the survey at the appropriate time, you can help by making sure your high school has updated contact information for your son or daughter. The biggest challenge in completing this survey is knowing how to contact the young adults. If your son or daughter or you complete the survey, all answers will be confidential and will be anonymously compiled into a report that shows how former students are doing. The results will be included in the Annual Performance Report (APR) that is submitted to the U.S. Department of Education every year. Transition to adult life is a process that works best when parents and students work with the school to prepare for the student's adult life. UPC VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH – JULY 2012

I would like to highlight Deanne Shields as our Volunteer of the Month. Deanne is the mother of four amazing children. Her children are very smart and talented but they have also struggled with various learning challenges like problems with working memory, ADHD, seizures and dyslexia. Deanne has a background in education which led her to teach



science and special education at a private school in Provo for 19 years. When her youngest child was four, she retired to spend more time at home with her children. During this time she had been taking some classes sponsored by the Utah Parent Center on IEP's and Negotiation and Advocacy when she met some women involved in the Learning Disabilities Association of Utah. It wasn't long before Deanne's leadership potential was discovered. The Utah Parent Center recruited her to attend a National Leadership Training called "Parents as Collaborative Leaders" at the Pacer Center in Minneapolis. This became the starting point for Deanne's involvement with LDAU. Being involved in organizations like LDAU and the Utah Parent Center has helped her in many ways. She has learned more about how to help her own children and has benefited from the advice received from parents and professionals. Deanne states, "It is so helpful to be able to talk with someone who has 'been there before' and get their advice and support." As a volunteer with LDAU, Deanne has had the opportunity of organizing education groups in Utah County for parents and teachers. She loves talking with parents and teachers to help them find resources for their children. In addition, Deanne has served as the President of LDAU for many years, began a support group for parents in Utah County, and recently developed a training for both parents and professionals giving practical solutions for helping with executive functioning skills. UPC VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH – AUGUST 2012

I would like to highlight Julie Ledford as our Volunteer of the Month. Julie and her husband Kevin have four boys. Kevin and three of the boys are blind. Her oldest, who is now 11 years old, was born with congenital cataracts which were removed when he was 2 months old. Julie's third son, who will turn 8 in September, was born with Anaridia. Anaridia means absence of iris and he literally has no iris. His eyes look like they are constantly dialated. Lastly, Julie's fourth son, who just turned 6, was born with both eye conditions. His cataracts were removed when he was 6



months old. All three boys are very light sensitive and have no peripheral vision or depth perception. Julie currently serves as President of the Utah Parents of Blind Children which is a Division of the National Federation of the Blind of Utah. Julie states, "I volunteer in the position and work with board members to empower our children and to ensure that blindness cannot stop you from reaching your goals." As an IEP Coach for the Utah Parent Center, Julie uses her training to help parents understand the IEP process. She has also participated in several parent panels at the University of Utah sharing the experiences of her family with future teachers. Julie's passion for her volunteer work comes from knowing many parents who are in the same situation she was in many years ago. Julie wants to make sure these parents know she understands their struggles and wants to help. Julie states, "No one should have to go through these challenges alone." 



DISABILITY AWARENESS PROGRAM - FRIENDS WHO CARE®



FRIENDS WHO CARE® is a complete disability awareness program for elementary students, developed by Easter Seals and sponsored by Friendly's. FRIENDS WHO CARE® is designed to help children better understand what it means and how it feels to be a young person with a disability. This educational program gives students the opportunity to learn what is involved when someone has a disability and how they adapt to live life, go to school, or work as independently as possible. The goals of the program are simple: to encourage typically developing children to accept their peers with disabilities as people first and also to find ways to include everyone in school and after-school activities.

FRIENDS WHO CARE® is also fun! The curriculum explores a range of disabilities and includes specially crafted learning activities, hands-on exercises, guided discussions and

guest speakers. It starts with an introduction to disability, and looks at vision, hearing, and physical disabilities and then at learning disabilities including AD-HD, autism and intellectual disabilities. We hope that your child will be an active participant in this new, exciting program and that FRIENDS WHO CARE® will help to bridge the gap between children with and without disabilities.
